#### California Humanities for All Accepting Applications for Small-Scale Public Humanities Projects.

California Humanities for All is now accepting applications for its Quick Grants program. These grants will be awarded three times a year for small-scale public humanities activities and projects that will take place within a one-year period from the award date. Projects should be grounded in the humanities, show potential to provide high quality humanities learning experiences for participants and audiences, and demonstrate capacity for successful implementation. Appropriate formats include but are not limited to community dialogues, reading or film and discussion groups, oral history or nonfiction writing or story-sharing workshops, and other types of activities. Cash or in-kind match of the award is not required.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

Eligibility: Any California-based nonprofit organization or non-federal public agency is eligible.

#### First Nations Invites Applications for Native Arts Program.

First Nations Development Institute works to restore Native American control and culturally-compatible stewardship of Native assets-be it land, human potential, cultural heritage, or natural resources, and to establish new assets for ensuring long-term vitality of Native American communities.

To advance that mission, First Nations has launched a new Supporting Native Arts grant opportunity under its Native Arts Initiative. Through the program, First Nations will award grants to Native-controlled nonprofit organizations and tribal governments that have programs in place that support Native artists and the field of traditional Native arts, as well as a demonstrated commitment to increasing the intergenerational transfer of knowledge of traditional Native artistic practices and the perpetuation of traditional Native arts.

Grant Amount: Grants of up to \$32,000 are available.

Eligibility: Entities eligible to apply include Native-controlled nonprofits 501(c)(3) organizations, tribes and tribal departments, tribal 7871 entities, or Native community-based groups with eligible

fiscal sponsors committed to supporting Native artists. Eligible applicants must be located in and serve tribal communities in one of the following regions: Upper Midwest (North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, and Wisconsin); the Southwest (Southern California, New Mexico, and Arizona); or the Pacific Northwest (Oregon and Washington).

**The Ovation Foundation Supports Programs that Cultivate Artists and Enterprises within the Creative Industries.**

The Ovation Foundation, via the 2017 Creative Economy innOVATION Grants cycle, recognizes model nonprofit organizations or programs that support and cultivate artists and enterprises within the creative industries. The key goal of a program should be the empowerment of fledgling enterprises to become fully developed through capacity-building, accelerating partnerships, and/or fiscal sponsorship and support. Grantees must be willing to be featured in various digital, print and broadcast media for Ovation LLC and The Ovation Foundation. Organizations with capacity-building programs are considered. These programs should be helping organizations that focus on one or more of the following creative industries: architecture and interior design, digital media, entertainment, fashion, furniture and decorative arts, industrial and product design, and visual and performing arts.

Grant Amount: Grant up to \$25,000 are available.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be a 501(c)(3) organization.

**The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards Invites Entries from Creative Teens.**

The Alliance for Young Artists & Writers, a nonprofit organization invites entries for its annual Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. Creative teens in grades 7-12 are invited to submit work in any of twenty-eight categories of art and writing, including film and animation, video game design, sculpture, photography, fashion design, poetry, journalism, humor, dramatic script, and science fiction.

Student submissions are judged on a regional level by the alliance's affiliates, with the top winning works then presented to national panels of creative leaders to determine which will receive the highest honors. Sixteen graduating high school seniors will be awarded with Portfolio Gold Medals, which

include a \$10,000 scholarship. Additional scholarships are made available to Portfolio Silver Medalists and through sponsored awards and stipends to summer arts programs.

Grant Amount: Awards total \$25,000.

Eligibility: To be eligible, students must be in grades 7-12 in a public, private, parochial, home school, or out-of-school program in the U.S. or Canada, or in an American school abroad.

### **The Japan Foundation Accepting Proposals for Japanese Performing Arts Grants.**

The Japan Foundation is accepting proposals from non-profit organizations in the US and Canada that aim to introduce Japanese performing arts to local audiences. PAJ Touring Grants help present Japanese performing arts at multiple locations in the United States and Canada, with an emphasis on locations outside major metropolitan areas.

PAJ Collaboration Grants help Japanese and American/Canadian artists develop a new work, which will further an appreciation of Japanese culture when presented to American/Canadian audiences. Additionally, the program supports collaborative projects between Japanese and American/Canadian performing artists. There are two types of grants:

1. **The Touring Grant** assists with the presentation of Japanese performing arts at multiple locations in the United States and/or Canada, with emphasis on locations outside major metropolitan areas where there is little exposure to Japanese performing arts.
2. **The Collaboration Grant** facilitates the collaboration of Japanese and American/Canadian artists so that they may create a new work through research, residencies, artists' discussions etc. with the potential to develop into a touring project and further an appreciation of Japanese culture when presented to audiences in the United States and Canada.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be a nonprofit institution with 501(c)(3) status based in the United States or Canada and are subject to the laws and regulations of the Japan Foundation.

### **The Levitt Foundation Invites Applications for Outdoor Music in Underused Spaces.**

The Levitt Foundation seeks to bring the joy of free, live music to people of all ages and backgrounds living in small to mid-sized towns and cities, transforming neglected public spaces into thriving community destinations. To that end, the foundation has issued a Call for Applications for its 2018



Levitt AMP Grant Awards program. Matching grants will be awarded to a minimum of ten U.S.-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, or municipalities partnering with a nonprofit, to present a minimum of ten free outdoor concerts presented over ten consecutive weeks between May 1 and November 15, 2018.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range up to \$25,000.

Eligibility: To be eligible, proposed projects must take place within the United States in small to midsized towns and cities with a population of up to 400,000 people and within a metropolitan area with a population of no more than one million. For towns or cities located within a metro area with a population that exceeds one million, the town or city must be at least twenty-five miles from the anchor city of the metro area. In addition, applicants must display a successful track record of presenting professional quality concerts or community events, or apply with a partner organization or individual that has done so. Applicants must also demonstrate dollar-for-dollar matching funds from other sources such as foundations, municipalities, 501(c)(3) nonprofits, or businesses.

#### **A Blade of Grass Invites Letters of Interest for Fellowship Opportunities Associated with Socially Engaged Art.**

A Blade of Grass (ABOG) provides resources to artists who demonstrate artistic excellence and serve as innovative conduits for social change. The ABOG fellowship supports socially engaged projects that promote art as a catalyst for social change; projects that feature artists in leadership roles; dialogue-based projects that emphasize active and sustainable partnerships with communities; and projects in which artists engage community members as equal partners on locally relevant issues, or globally relevant issues as they apply to the local context. Projects in which co-creation with non-artists is part of the process are highly encouraged.

Fellowship projects become the focus of a short, engaging documentary film directed and produced by RAVA Films; field research that utilizes action research methodology; Web content and public programs; a biennial publication; curriculum and advocacy that advance the field of socially engaged art; and two dedicated opportunities to engage a cohort of peer artists.

Grant Amount: Grant awards of \$20,000 are available.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants include individual artists or an artist's collective with projects that engage directly with a specific community or communities. To be eligible, artists may not currently be enrolled as students and must be a citizen or legal resident of the United States.

### **College Art Association Accepting Applications for Wyeth Art Publication Grants.**

The Wyeth Foundation for American Art supports publication of books on American Art through the Wyeth Foundation for American Art Publication Grant. The program supports the publication of book-length scholarly manuscripts in the history of American art, visual studies, and related subjects that have been accepted by a publisher on their merits but cannot be published in the most desirable form without a subsidy.

For the purposes of this program, “American art” is defined as art created in the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

The program will not consider excavation or other technical reports, articles, previously published works (including collections of previously published essays), or congress proceedings. Museum exhibition or collection catalogues containing substantial scholarship are eligible.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified

Eligibility: Eligible entities do not include the author, but rather the publisher. Awards are open to publishers of all nations; authors need not live or work in the United States. Commercial, university, and museum presses are all eligible.

### **The YoungArts Foundation Invites Applications for 2018 Young Artists Prizes.**

The National YoungArts Foundation provides emerging artists (ages 15-18 or grades 10-12) with opportunities to work with renowned mentors, apply for scholarships, and gain national recognition throughout their careers.

The YoungArts Foundation is now accepting applications for its 2018 Prize cycle. Support is offered in ten artistic disciplines: cinematic arts, dance, design, jazz, music, photography, theater, visual arts, voice, and writing. All YoungArts Winners are exposed to professional and educational opportunities, including the chance to work with and learn from renowned artists in their fields (e.g., Debbie Allen, Mikhail Baryshnikov, Judith Hill, Placido Domingo, Frank Gehry, Neil Patrick Harris, Jeff Koons, Wynton Marsalis, Sallman Rushdie, Carrie Mae Weems, and others), and (space permitting) are eligible to participate in one of Young Arts’ annual regional programs in Miami, Los Angeles, or New York.

The YoungArts Foundation also provides students in its program access to a strong professional network of more than twenty thousand alumni, as well as ongoing professional guidance and the opportunity to perform and exhibit their work at some of the nation’s leading cultural institutions. There is a \$35 non-refundable application fee per category; fee waivers are available.

Grant Amount: Up to \$10,000 in cash awards are available for prize recipients.

Eligibility: To be eligible, students must be citizens or legal residents of the United States or U.S. territories between the ages of 15-18 on December 1, 2017, or in grades 10-12, may apply. International students who are studying in the U.S. on a student visa also are eligible to apply.

**The Ethics and Excellence Journalism Foundation (EEJF) Accepting Letters of Inquiry for Professional Development and Attention to Investigative Reporting for Journalism.**

The Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation's mission is to invest in the future of journalism by building the ethics, skills and opportunities needed to advance principled, probing news and information now and for the future. EEJF does so through contributions to media institutions and journalism schools, primarily in areas of investigative reporting, professional development, Oklahoma journalism, and special opportunities. Within each of these program areas, the Foundation gives special preference to programs focusing on ethics and new media.

- **Investigative Reporting:** Through its support of non-profit investigative organizations and educational institutions, the Foundation seeks to:
  - Increase the quantity, quality and ethical standards of investigative reporting and watchdog journalism on state and local issues;
  - Stimulate and nurture the development of organizations, infrastructures, services, collaborations and business models that can help secure a future for investigative reporting and watchdog journalism;
  - Encourage the development of digital innovations that make data about state and local issues more available to the public.
  
- **Professional Development:** Through its support of professional development programs at non-profits and educational institutions, the Foundation seeks to:
  - Improve the credibility and impact of journalism;
  - Stimulate adherence to the highest ethical standards and practices by both traditional and new media;
  - Sustain and encourage more journalism that produces civic results;
  - Help journalists make use of new tools and new outlets for their work;
  - Increase and renew the enthusiasm of journalists for their important work.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be non-profit organizations focused on the news media or a journalism school.

### **The Grammy Museum Announces Funding to Support Music Archiving and Preservation Efforts.**

The GRAMMY Museum Grant Program awards grants to organizations and individuals to support efforts that advance the archiving and preservation of the music and recorded sound heritage of the Americas. The Archiving and Preservation area has two funding categories: Preservation Implementation and Assistance, Assessment and/or Consultation.

Preservation Implementation Grants are available to help individuals and large organizations enhance their ability to preserve their collections that embody the recorded sound heritage of North America. Large organizations are defined as organizations with annual budgets of \$500,000 or more and/or are located within an institution that includes a library or museum or other division in which archiving, preservation, cataloguing and other related experts are accessible to the project.

The goal of the Preservation Implementation grant is to fund projects where the project materials have been identified and are in possession of the applicant, where preliminary assessment and planning has occurred, and where the applicant has addressed and/or is ready to implement the following:

- Prioritization of materials (based on uniqueness, historical significance, and at-risk status)
- Inventory and cataloging of the materials
- Stabilized, climate controlled storage of materials
- Address ownership or rights issues
- Identification of qualified staff and/or vendors
- Planned preservation methodology
- Identification of long-term storage
- Broad dissemination plan

Preservation Assistance Grants are available to help individuals and small to mid-sized organizations enhance their ability to preserve their collections that embody the recorded sound heritage of North America. Small to mid-sized organizations are defined as organizations with annual budgets of less than \$500,000 and limited or no organizational access to “in-house” experts.

The goal of a Preservation Assistance grant is to fund the planning, assessment and preparation of recorded sound collections to be archived and preserved. Applicants must describe how they will draw on the knowledge and expertise of their staff and/or outside consultants whose preservation skills are related to the type of collection and nature of activities that are the focus of the project. A department with a budget of less than \$500,000, located within an institution with a budget of more than \$500,000 such as a library, museum or other organization in which archiving, preservation,

cataloguing and other related experts are accessible to the project, should apply under the Implementation category and incorporate planning into their request as needed.

Grant Amount: Preservation Implementation grants range up to \$20,000. Preservation Assistance grants range up to \$5,000.

Eligibility: Applicants must be a 501(c)(3) organization or an individual.

Due Date: Letters of Inquiry must be received no later than October 1, 2017. Upon review, selected applicants will be invited to submit a full proposal.

**The Caplan Foundation for Early Childhood Invites Letters of Intent to Support Early Childhood Programs.**

The Caplan Foundation for Early Childhood supports innovative, creative projects and programs with potential to significantly enhance the development, health, safety, education, and/or quality of life of children from infancy through five years of age. The foundation provides funding in the areas of early childhood welfare, early childhood education and play, and parenting education as stated below:

1. **Early Childhood welfare:** Children can only reach their full potential when all aspects of their development—intellectual, emotional, and physical are optimally supported. Providing a safe and nurturing environment for infants and preschoolers is essential, as is imparting to them the skills of social living in a culturally diverse world. To that end, the foundation supports programs that research best child-rearing practices and identify models that can provide creative, caring environments in which all children can thrive.
2. **Early Childhood Education and Play:** Research shows that children need to be stimulated and nurtured early in life if they are to succeed in school, work, and life. Such preparation relates to every aspect of a child's development, from birth to age 5, and everywhere a child learns- at home, in childcare settings, and in preschool. The foundation seeks to improve the quality of both early childhood teaching and learning through the development of innovative curricula and research-based pedagogical standards, as well as the design of imaginative play materials and learning environments.
3. **Parenting Education:** To help parents create nurturing environments for their children, the foundation supports programs that teach parents about developmental psychology, cultural child-rearing differences, pedagogy, issues of health, prenatal care and diet, and programs that provide both cognitive and emotional support to parents.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be considered tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code.

#### **The Brady Education Foundation Accepting Applications for Underserved Youth Education.**

The Brady Education Foundation is now accepting applications for two types of education projects for underserved youth. These education projects include, program development and program evaluation:

1. **Program Development:** These projects develop and test the feasibility of new programs for promoting positive cognitive and/or achievement outcomes for children (birth through 18 years) from underserved groups and/or low-resourced communities (minority ethnic groups, low-income families). For this type of project the Foundation favors projects that:
  - Represent strong collaborative relationships between researchers and practitioners, and other community stakeholders as appropriate, and where the community/population being studied is represented in the project's leadership team;
  - Develop programs consistent with strength-based approaches rather than deficit models;
  - Leverage other funding;
  - Develop programs that, in addition to showing promise of being effective, show promise of being affordable, accessible and sustainable.
  - Consider the specific and unique assets and needs of children from underserved populations and/or low-resourced communities (e.g., minority ethnic groups, low-income communities). Concerning race and ethnicity, the Foundation seeks to increase understanding of what works best for children from diverse racial, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds (e.g., African American, Latino, Native American).
2. **Existing Program Evaluation:** These projects evaluate the effectiveness of programs designed to promote positive cognitive and/or achievement outcomes for children (birth through 18 years) from underserved groups and/or low-resourced communities (minority ethnic groups, low-income families). For this type of project, the Foundation favors projects that:

- Represent strong collaborative relationships between researchers and practitioners, and other community stakeholders as appropriate, and where the community/population being studied is represented in the project's leadership team;
- Evaluate programs consistent with strength-based approaches rather than deficit models;
- Projects for which operational funding for the program is already secured so that funding from the Foundation is used only for evaluation activities;
- Evaluate programs that show promise of being affordable, accessible and sustainable;
- Projects that employ randomized control designs (including wait-list control designs when assignment to wait-list condition is randomized). Comparison group designs may also be employed when strong efforts are made to control for potential confounding variables (e.g., due to selection effects). The Foundation rarely funds evaluation projects that employ neither randomized control nor comparison group designs;
- Projects that evaluate effects on measurable child outcomes.
- Consider the specific and unique assets and needs of children from underserved populations and/or low-resourced communities (e.g., minority ethnic groups, low-income communities). Concerning race and ethnicity, the Foundation seeks to increase understanding of what works best for children from diverse racial, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds (e.g., African American, Latino, Native American).

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations only. The foundation will not fund scholarships, capital projects, projects outside of the United States, evaluations conducted by for-profit organizations or the development of programs intended to become for-profit entities, program development and evaluation for children at risk for poor cognitive and academic outcomes due to medical conditions (including developmental delays or disabilities associated with biological causes) or substance abuse, scaling up programs already found to be effective nor continuing education for providers.

### **The Road Runners Club of America Supports Youth Running Programs.**

The Road Runners Club of America (RRCA) supports youth running programs through the Kids Run the Nation Fund. This fund helps nonprofit organizations and schools in the U.S. that are interested in implementing or currently have a youth running program. Grants are provided to running clubs and other nonprofit organizations such as parent booster clubs, PTAs, etc. Elementary and middle schools that provide organized after-school running programs are also eligible to apply.

Since the goal of the grant program is to have kids running at least once a week for multiple weeks, funded running programs should offer more than just one-time events.

Kids Run the Nation grants may fund:

- The program may be a start-up program or a pre-existing program.

**The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Accepting Pre-Applications for Community and Economic Development Grants.**

The Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), established by the Catholic Bishops of the United States, is committed to supporting organizations led by low-income individuals as they work to break the cycle of poverty and improve their communities. CCHD's grant programs include Community Development Grants and Economic Development Grants.

1. **Community Development Grants** support nonprofit organizations that nurture the participation of people living in poverty to change structures and policies that affect their lives.
2. **Economic Development Grants** support economic development institutions that include the voice of the poor and marginalized in developing new businesses that offer good jobs or develop assets that will be owned by local communities.

The five types of programs funded by these grants include real estate initiatives, business incubators, community development financial institutions, social purpose and training, and worker-owned and community businesses.

At least 50 percent of those benefiting from the organization's efforts must be people experiencing poverty. Priorities of low-income people must be central to the organization's agenda and evidence of genuine solidarity and cooperation in overcoming poverty must be seen. People living in poverty must have the dominant voice in the organization. Evidence of leadership development processes that prepare low-income people to participate in leadership roles, such as the board, must be in place. CHD is concerned about the growth, development, and dignity of the individual person as well as the collective strengthening of the low income community.

The applicant organization must demonstrate both the intention and the capacity to effectively work toward the elimination of the root causes of poverty and to enact institutional change. The organization's efforts should directly benefit a relatively large number of people, rather than a few individuals.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range from \$25,000 to \$75,000.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be a 501(c)(3) organization. Applicant organizations must not participate in or promote activities that contradict the moral and social teachings of the Catholic Church and must in no way work against the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' priorities to defend human life and dignity, strengthen family life and the institution of marriage, and foster diversity. For example, applicant organizations that support or promote same-sex marriage, discrimination, capital punishment, abortion, euthanasia, or punitive measures towards immigrants are not eligible for CCHD funding.

- **Mentoring Activities:** Within the context of a mentoring network activities may include, but are not limited to, dedicated efforts at providing technical expertise, advice, insight, and professional career skills that advance the broad career goals of graduate students, post doctorates and/or early-career faculty; facilitating scholarly writing and grantsmanship; promoting successful transitions from one career stage to another; providing leadership development; helping to identify potential collaborators; helping to establish interdisciplinary or translational collaborations in order to foster a career trajectory towards independent NIAID-related research.

The United States Department of Transportation, through the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) and The Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act), is now accepting applications from nonprofit organizations for (1) conducting national outreach and training programs to assist communities in preparing for and responding to accidents and incidents involving the transportation of hazardous materials, including Class 3 flammable liquids by rail; and (2) training state and local personnel responsible for enforcing the safe transportation of hazardous materials, including Class 3 flammable liquids.

The Group Foundation for Advancing Mental Health supports therapeutic group work by advancing the most effective and innovative approaches to group therapy education, training, research, and community outreach. To that end, the foundation is seeking applications from researchers focused on the effectiveness of group psychotherapy. Grants will be awarded based on the importance of the research to the field, the seniority of the investigator's, and the number of research applications received.

Funding could be used to support the basic costs of research (e.g., supplies, research equipment, photocopying, postage, computer services, statistical consultation and research assistant salaries); investigator salaries and travel expenses are not funded. (Equipment purchase for use on a research project is to be donated to an institution at the completion of the project.)

Grant Amount: Grants range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

Eligibility: Mental Health Providers are eligible to apply for funding.
